


From 28 February 1943 to present, the pilots and enlisted men of this organization participated in the campaign of the Northern Solomon Islands. The superiority of their training was amply demonstrated during this campaign. (2) Duration: From 26 February 1943 to date in combat crew rotation, 10 weeks in the Solomon Islands, 9 days rest leave in Auckland, New Zealand, after which they return to this base for continued operations. (5) Authority ordering: All pilots and crews ordered into action per Radiogram, Commanding General Thirteenth Fighter Command. g. Battles: (1) (a) During the periods of operations in the Solomon Islands from 20 February 1943, the pilots and crews have stood ground and air alerts over Guadalcanal, Russells and New Georgia. Towards the end of October 1943, intruder missions and night strafing missions were begun over Bougainville. (b) Pilots have on several instances intercepted Jap night raiders and either shot them down or prevented them from making their runs over their targets. Planes, supply dumps and barges have been destroyed during the night intruder missions on Bougainville. - 3 -



k. Miscellaneous:

- (1) Detachment 'B' Night Fighter Squadron introduced instruction fighting in this area. Raids have been made in bomb-carrying P-38's and P-P's upon the airfields, bivouac areas and barges on the Island of Bougainville. Enemy planes have been destroyed on the ground, ack-ack guns have been silenced and one barge has been blown up.
- (2) During the landing operations on Bougainville on 1 November 1943, planes of Detachment 'B' Night Fighter Squadron supplied night cover over the Task Force and landing barges.
- (3) Detachment 'B' Night Fighter Squadron has been disbanded as of 2400 15 December 1943 and the personnel and equipment have been absorbed by the newly arrived 419th Night Fighter Squadron.
- (4) Detachment 'B' originally, the 6th Night Fighter Squadron (Det) has earned the reputation as one of the best AAF units in this area. The pilots have earned the gratitude of the soldiers in the Solomon Islands who have been able to sleep more soundly due to the support of the night fighters. Much credit for the success of the Detachment's operations go to the enlisted men of the unit, who, by their ingenuity and inventiveness, in spite of the shortage of tools and equipment managed to keep the planes in excellent condition. To these men, the pilots and the enlisted men of Detachment 'B' Night Fighter Squadron, go the heartfelt 'Thanks' of the warriors of the Solomon Islands for those "Japless" nights.

SUBJECT: COMMENDATION.

TO : The Thirteenth Air Force.

- 1. From 25 July 1943, to 20 November 1943, Major General Nathan Twining, by direction of Comsopac and pursuant to the air employment directives and policies of Comairsopac, commanded the Allied Air Forces Solomons, Brigadier General Dean C. Strother, served as Fighter Commander, while Brigadier General William A. Mathony (then Colonel) was Bomber Commander.
- 2. During this period, immeasurable damage was done to the enemy. His ships and barges were destroyed, all of the New Georgia Group was overrun by our forces, Treasury was captured, and Bou gainville was i nva ded the Jap was subjected to heavy loss of aircraft and personnel, and his Bo ugainville airdromes were made untenable. As a result we have materially improved our position for further assaults on the enemy, and we have acquired important naval facilities and many fine additional aird romes. A great s ha re of the credit for these victories go es to the Air Arm; to the airmen of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Royal New Zealand Air For ce, both sho re a n d car rier based.
- 3. In all this the 13th Air Force, its Fighter Com m a n d, Bomber Command, Service Command, and all the officers and men of flight and ground echelons have had a major role, Your contribution for the success of the campaigns of the Armed Forces is inspiring to all. Your courage, your spirit of high endeavor, your patient endurance of discomforts, hards hips and dangers your cheer fulness thru all and your will to win are a source of pride to all who are concerned with the de struction of Japanese Forces, the annihilation of his military power and the imposition of swift retribution on his military leaders, his government and subjects.
- 4. The 13th Air Force will continue to carry the fight until the Jap is completly crushed, and made to pay many times over for the crimes he has committed against our airmen, soldiers, sailors, and marines, and for the bestial deceit and brutality of Pearl Harbor, the Philippines, China and Malaya.
- 5. The 13th Air Force, born on the 13th of January, 1943, is now almost a year old—and what ayear! Many of you men of this force have been carrying on in this area since before our attacks and capture of Guadalcanal and Tulagi. You have worked and sweated through the mud and heat, the malaria, the dangers and hardships of the early days at Efate, Espiri tu Santo and Guadalcanal. You wondered then if our meager force could really stop the Jap. But soon this doubt changed to confidence as the gathering power and momentum of our forces increased, and then you helped to break forever the myth of Jap invincibility and to blast him out of Guadalcanal, the Russells, Munda and all of New Georgia Group, and now Treasury and Bougainville. You have seen him defeated in the air, on the ground and on the sea. The issue is no longer in doubt.
